SUMMER IN THE PARK -- IT'S COMING SOONER THAN YOU THINK!

On <u>Tuesday</u> night, <u>June 5th</u>, from <u>6 o'clock</u> to about 8, there will be a concert in Grace Court Park. Playing for you will be a folk-singing duo, Sheppard and Mannring. They play the banjo, the mandolin, the guitar, the fiddle and the dobro (deaubreau?). They sing early, traditional folk music, stuff from the 20's and 30's, some country, a little bit of Hawaiian, even. Admission is free, and your money will be cheerfully refunded if you don't like the show.

Those of you who have attended concerts in the summer evenings at Grace Court during the past two or three years know how relaxed and pleasurable that can be. It's especially a good thing when you bring some of your neighbors and even your friends who are less fortunate than you and live in some other part of town. Picnics and concerts harmonize beautifully, so bring a blanket and a basket.

Warning -- if you simply cannot tolerate watching children -- yours or other people's-- enjoying themselves, you should consider not coming to these concerts. Ditto if you are a workaholic and cannot abide the sight of adults lolling about on the greensward. If you like music and lazy summer evenings but don't feel like socializing, there is plenty of room in Grace Court for you to have it your way -- no one will insist on your acting the false and painful role of the hail-fellow-well-met. On the other hand, this is a good chance to get to know your neighbors, should you want to do that sort of thing.

There will be another concert in July, probably a jazz group, and there is tentatively a brass band puffing it's way here for August. See upcoming newsletters for details.

and the efforts of many hard-working volunteers led by Dot Wise and Mary Beth Blackwell-Chapperson had not paid off.

And pay off it did. That weekend, \$687.85 were added to your Association's coffers -- specifically into the Historic Preservation District Fund. \$579.10 came from the"20%" of the gross yard sale proceeds (make that the yard sale gross proceeds -- anyway, the total take) and from gifts. \$108.75 came from the bake sale. At least an additional \$17.50 has trickled in, if not more, since the monthly meeting on May 8th.

The Historic District Fund balance is now up to \$5,238. The sun shone all day long. And people had a pleasant time. The whole thing is rather bourgeois, if you think about it, but about the only neighborhood association that isn't was the Haight-Asbury one out in San Francisco in the late 60's, and it didn't last. . . going up in smoke as it did. OTHER STUFF TALKED ABOUT AT THE MONTHLY MEETING:

The most important topic on the agenda of any meeting is the time and location of the next meeting. After about 2 seconds' deliberation, it was decided that the June meeting of your Association board will be held on June 12th at 8 p.m. at Ben & Julia Wilson's House.

The YMCA initially put a row of parking spaces too close to Sunset, within the allowable 10 feet. As it was making it s expansion plans, this violation was discovered, and the Y was told it needed a waiver. Thus, the sign you might have noticed in the Y parking lot. Several members of your association met with Y-M representatives to discuss this waiver, the Y's expansion plans in general, and in particular the obvious need for the Y-M to do some serious, long-term landscaping. Apparently, the Zoning Board agrees with West Enders, and the Y is being required to do some planting over the next 3 years in order to get the parking variance. Altogether, the Y-M is trying to add about 75 spaces, mostly in the Glade Street side. The Board passed a resolution that we investigate the desirability and feasibility of having residential parking permits for West Enders who live near the Y-M.

Someone also pointed out that the old apartment building at the corner of Sunset and Forsyth has been demolished, apparently to make way for construction of some new condos. The question was raised as to whether the developers had complied with all parking requirements for the new project. Your board is trying to be vigilant, in an effective way, on questions like these. Needless to say, zoning matters, this time of a more general nature, managed to occupy much of the discussion.



Some of you have undoubtedly seem a black, cruddy substance on the leaves of your maple trees. This does not mean that your tree is dying, nor that it is going into a rebellious adolescense and should be sent off to military school at the earliest opportunity. No, your maple probably is suffering from anthracnose, which is a fungus which sometimes appears when buds are subjected to windy, cool, wet weather -- the kind of conditions that we've had this spring. Don't reach for theAbsorbine Jr., says the county Agricultural Extension Agent (OK, he put it into more scientific terms), 'cause it's too late.
