Try as we all do to be different, there are times when *The West Ender* marches to the same drummer. Like our Big Brothers of main-stream media, we offer holiday babble: a year-end review with a glimpse of the future.

Last year brought forth the sound of concrete mixers in and around West End. There is going to be no let up in 1997. Meridian Group's new Fourth Street office complex, the YWCA's rehabilitation pool and Wachovia's reconstructive surgery at the Modern Chevy Corners of the World are all moving forward. The YWCA's project is virtually completed. Wachovia has made significant progress. The old Sears Building is no longer even a shadow of its former self. More than 800 tickets were purchased for the 1996 tour. Preliminary figures show the event netted over \$2,500.00 for the West End Association. The pre-tour article in the Winston-Salem Journal was another big lift for the neighborhood. The piece was the result of work done by Kristina Ebbink, publicity committee chair.

Carolyn Moore, assisted by Todd Fay, was in charge of advance ticket sales. David Wallace, who moved from West End to West Highlands, not only was a tour sponsor but he also did something called "home operations," zipping from place to place delivering carpet remnants and other items.

Wanda Merschel, former West End president, put together an outstanding team of house captains and volunteers. Decorations committee chair was Kathy Otterbourg. The pre-tour party at her Clover Street home was a wonderful pep rally for the volunteers.

Missy Vaughan was in charge of the reception at the Woman's Club, an excellent central point for the tour's transportation fleet. The city's new bus terminal will never be as good.



of Transportation announced plans to turn Crafton Street into a dead-end street by replacing the I-40 bridge that goes over Crafton Street with a mound of dirt. Listing all the reasons this is a bad idea would take up far too space. Ms. Ladd responded to the proposal by doing a remarkable job of mobilizing people and encouraging them to voice their concerns to the DOT.

A public hearing was held on December 5. Despite the fact that it was a very cold and rainy night, over 100 people showed up...most of which had been visited by Patti Ladd who obtained several hundred signatures on a petition protesting the proposal to close Crafton Street. Over 24 people signed up to speak. Many people felt that the meeting could've ended after Patti Ladd's speech since she said most of what needed to be said in a ten minute presentation that would've put most orators to shame.

Less than a week after the meeting, the DOT announced that they were abandoning the proposal to close Crafton Street in response to the public outcry. Some positive things came out of the meeting. It was universally acknowledged that there's too much traffic on West End Boulevard and that the cars need to be slowed down. Unfortunately there's no easy answer to this problem. Local transportation officials were put on notice that this is an issue many people have very strong feelings about. It was also agreed that the Ardmore and West End neighborhood associations need to work together on issues such as traffic and crime control. Stay tuned.
