## **Membership dues**

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**A word (several, actually) from the editor**

This is the time of year when people reflect on the past and plan for the future – so what better time is there to think about the direction in which the West End is heading?

We have seen lots of positive changes in our physical environment. The Association has been involved in an ambitious and very successful fund-raising effort to purchase and install historic signs throughout the neighborhood, as well as a Victorian clock and sitting wall in Grace Court. A time capsule, which will be opened in 2049, was recently installed into the base of the clock. Homeowners will soon be able to purchase historic district house signs that match the street signs. The Association also recently collaborated with area merchants to plant trees in the Burke Street corridor.

We have also seen some changes in the operation of the Association. The Association has become involved in grant-writing efforts. The Burke Street tree project was funded by a grant to the Winston-Salem Foundation, along with support from the Winston-Salem Garden Club, and the city's Office of Roadway Appearances. Association members also recently submitted a proposal to the state to purchase period lighting around Grace Court. The proposal was not considered for funding, because of the need for the state to funnel resources to those stricken by hurricane Floyd. It should be submitted again. The newsletter is now hand-delivered to every apartment and home in the West End. Business sponsorship of the newsletter has grown from 12 to 50.

Where do we go from here? Membership, which has been as high as 120, is now 40. Perhaps, the reason for this is that the newsletter is delivered to everyone regardless of whether or not they have paid their dues. However, I believe that many people simply forget when their membership lapses. A membership drive will likely be necessary. Perhaps the Association needs some sort of system to notify residents when their membership renewal is due.

The West End Association has been working so hard over the past couple of years to achieve the accomplishments listed above that, perhaps, we have let the social aspect of the Association fall by the wayside. We need a Social Chairman and Committee to get us together on a regular basis. The block parties that were held in the summer of 1999 were a lot of fun – and several people suggested to me that we should have these on an annual basis. Perhaps we could go out to dinner together the last Friday of every month, carpool to a house or garden tour in the region, plan a picnic at Salem Lake...


I would also like to think that, at some point in the future, the Association would spearhead an effort to install period lighting through the neighborhood. This would be esthetically pleasing, and would enhance the safety of our neighborhood as well. My husband and I frequently take walks in the evening and have noticed that some areas of the West End are very dark – such as on the hill adjacent to the YMCA, and on West End Boulevard. We could start with Grace

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Gateway signage was suggested in the most recent long-range plan, and I think that we should look into the feasibility of purchasing and installing such signs at key entrance points to the neighborhood

Gardens, gardens, gardens. One of the least expensive ways to beautify the neighborhood would be to encourage the planting of period gardens. Perhaps we could arrange to have representatives from the garden club, or David Bare from the W-S Journal talk with us about garden design. We could think about holding a biannual garden tour. I had the opportunity to travel to Australia recently. While I was there, I toured some beautiful butterfly gardens. Wouldn't it be great to plant a big butterfly garden in Hanes Park – in the large stretch of land between the creek and West End Boulevard? There is absolutely nothing there now. We could do this incrementally, adding a new garden patch every year or so – separating them with low-cost gravel paths, adding a bench here or there... Another prime garden spot is the Duke Power strip of land adjacent to the Hawthorne Road & W. First Street exit ramp from route 40W...

I could go on...but just one more closing thought. I think big dreams are important – because that is the only way to realize big accomplishments. The West End was brought back to life by the dreams of people who saw that our neighborhood didn't have to sink into the decay that is so common among downtown neighborhoods. The West End is a truly great place to live today because of their vision and work. We owe it to them and to future West End residents to dream our biggest dreams. As my mother used to say, "Only she who attempts the absurd can achieve the impossible!"

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
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
