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Notable Trees of the West End: The Sassafras

One day while enjoying the babble of Runnymeade Creek an interesting tree caught my eye. It had an immense trunk and deeply furrowed bark with ridges breaking up into cork-like plates.



As I looked up at its contorted branch structure and variable leaves that looked like mittens with one to three lobes, I realized that it was a sassafras albidum. This was the largest sassafras I'd ever seen. This particular sassafras is in the ravine that runs down the west side of Hanes Park between Hawthorne and Wiley. It is near the stone bridge that goes over Runnymeade Creek. There are other smaller specimens on the park edges along Glade and Sunset that are more typical of sassafras. Thickets form where the roots of these trees sucker up and create many small trees from one. However, the most picturesque sassafras in the West End is on the YMCA property. It sits on an eroded hillside overlooking the YMCA's main parking lot to the left of the men's entrance.

In the spring you may notice the small yellow blooms of the sassafras before much else comes to life. The tree's aromatic bark and roots have been used to treat various ailments as teas and also to make root beer. The oils have been used in perfumes. And if you like gumbo then you've probably eaten sassafras leaves. The filé that is used to flavor and thicken this Cajun dish is made of dried and crushed sassafras leaves. There is evidence however, that points to sassafras as a carcinogen. I have heard this about basil, black pepper and grilled foods too. On the other hand, these plants have nutritive and medicinal values. There is little we enjoy that doesn't have some potentially negative element in it. So I will eat my gumbo, grilled whatever, and sassafras tea – just not every day!

St. Paul's Episcopal - A New Creation **By Ian Hammon**

Today at noon, I met with the property manager of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, John Markle. St. Paul's is the ornate cathedral-like edifice on Summit Street, between Fifth and Sixth streets. John has worked there for the past decade and is now supervising the construction of the addition to the central core of buildings that make up the church.

John took me on a tour of the bell tower, where I wanted to get an eagle's view of the surrounding property. From behind the choir pews in the chancel, we entered a small, spiral staircase in a narrow shaft going up for a breathless fifty steps. On the way up, we passed small, medieval looking embrasures in the wall, as well as a small door leading to the innards of St. Paul's pride and joy, the Skinner organ. At the top of the stairs, another small door led to a chamber acting as an attic, dusty and rough-hewn. The ceiling above was actually the platform for the bells. A ladder led past the bells to the top of the tower.

John preceded me up the ladder. I felt like we were climbing up the tower of Notre Dame, especially as we passed three large bells on the way up. At the top of the ladder, we reached a platform housing the mechanical motors that power the bells. As soon as we caught our breath, the bells began to ring, signaling the noon hour. The peals were so deafening, I had to hold my ears. The top of the tower offered a 360-degree view of downtown, the rest of the West End district, and across the Hawthorne curve toward Baptist hospital and the Ardmore neighborhood. Through narrow windows in each wall, I could get a look around.

As I looked down, John explained the construction that we saw below us, which will transform this church community. The additions, housing a chapel, new areas for the education department and the administrative offices, as well as more space for parking, will occur over the next couple of years. Jane Munden, whom I spoke with after I returned from my lofty visit to lower perches, mentioned these activities as she directed me to the scaled model of the church, complete with the additions.

"I hope I live to see this happen", Jane said, pointing out the changes in store for the choir. Jane and her husband have been members of the choir for several years. Their rehearsal space will have to relocate during the construction. Barbara Beattie, the choir director, and the various adult and children's choirs will eventually settle into their new places when the work is finished. The nave, the chancel, and the sanctuary will not be affected by the work done on the rest of the church. The members of St. Paul's can count on an uninterrupted worship schedule while they prepare to live into a new church home.
