Fall is in the air. Although it's still pretty hot during the day, the days are getting noticeably shorter and the nights are cool. For those of us without air conditioning this is an especially



delightful time of year. Another indication is the fall coloring of our native Dogwoods (cornus florida) that are beginning to show their red foliage and scarlet berries that persist as bird food into the winter. Dogwoods are the first trees to turn color, and in the spring they are one of the first to bloom. The bloom also happens to be our state flower. The bark is light grey with deep, dark furrows that break the bark into small plates. This texture and the gracefully contorted branches make the Dogwood striking in the winter landscape. Dogwoods are small, understory trees, but sometimes reach heights over 20 feet. For all these reasons they are popular trees, but unfortunately there is a fungus called Anthracnose that is now afflicting our native Dogwoods. Anthracnose is evidenced by a powdery coating on the leaves. The leaves may also look wrinkled or wilted. Unfortunately there is little that can be done to save affected trees. Large, old trees can be appreciated while they last, but it will certainly hasten their demise. Treatments are available for smaller dogwoods, but if the tree is susceptible to the fungus you will probably end up having to repeat treatments. Personally I would replace an affected tree with one that is less vulnerable.

Nurseries sell resistant cultivars of cornus florida. Another option is the cornus kousa, a Japanese Dogwood with similar flowers and habits as cornus florida. However, its flowers are born later in the summer, and its seeds are contained in an orange, bumpy, fruit-like structure that is about the size of a gumball with a geodesic pattern. Unfortunately, these fruits are abundant, and soon after ripening they fall off the tree, which can make a mess on the street or sidewalk. On a good note, these fruits are tasty. If you squeeze out the pulp, avoiding the thick, mealy skin and the seed, you may find its taste reminds you of a cross between a mango, pear and perhaps a plum. The bark on the Japanese Dogwood is smooth, but peels off the older trees, resulting in a modeled, or what I call a "camouflage" affect. This feature and its elegant branch structure are shown off the best when the branches have been thinned out. If you would like to compare these two species of Dogwood, there are two conveniently-placed examples of both cornus florida and cornus kousa in front of 817 West End Boulevard.

#### West End: A Look Back

Tom Angelo grew up in the West End and has spent most of his life in the house his parents built at the corner of 6<sup>th</sup> and Broad streets. In the 70-plus years he has spent in the West End neighborhood, Mr. Angelo has seen tremendous change and overall improvement. Many of his early memories date back to the decade of the depression when everyone was struggling to get by. Then, as now, there was a mixture of housing types and incomes in the West End. From white-collar professionals to domestic workers. from shacks, tenant housing and apartments to large mansions, the West End has always been a diverse neighborhood.

Mr. Angelo remembers with particular fondness an open field near the corner of Summit and 6<sup>th</sup> streets where he, his six siblings, and the other neighborhood children played baseball, (across from where the Answorth Apartments are now). He also remembers special events such as May Day held at the West End School where he attended 4<sup>th</sup> grade (now the site of the Wachovia Data Center on 4 ½ Street). Being within walking distance of school was one of the main reasons his father chose to build in the West End. 'My father chose this place because he said 'you can walk to school, church, downtown, just about anywhere you need to go.' We had cars back then, but we didn't depend on them like we do today." "I remember my Grandmother would walk over to visit us...She lived in the neighborhood near Reynolds High School. She would walk over and take us to Grace Court to play. Then we would take the 7 ¢ streetcar back to her house. The stop was near Reynolds High School." On Burke Street Mr. Angelo recalls there wasn't nearly as much development. "There was a lot of residential – some apartments, duplexes, nothing too fancy. My Uncle EJ built a store there, a grocery, in the late 20's or early 30's..." (the building that now houses Burke St. Pizza). His Uncle EJ's grocery was one of three "fancy groceries" in the West End at the time. The other two were down at the bottom of the hill on West End Blvd. near where the antique shops are now. In addition to the fancy groceries that delivered, a number of "mom & pop" groceries were found throughout the neighborhood.

As for neighbors, Mr. Angelo remembers the neighbors on his block were very close, particularly because of the children. "I counted at one time 22 children in these 6 houses (on the block)...Now there are probably about 3. We were more neighborly then in the sense that we were always playing together, so our parents would interact with each other." Mr. Angelo doesn't think that kids are as close today as they were when he was growing up. However, he says the West End as a whole is more connected by the large, neighborhood-wide events such as the 4<sup>th</sup> of July parties and ice cream socials. While much has changed in the West End over the years, some of its best attributes remain. We still enjoy a convenient location in a walkable neighborhood and neighbors still feel a sense of community.


