



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Birds of the West End: Spring Migration

Right now we are in the midst of the spring migration, which began the end of February with

MIGRATORIUS should have arrived too, but recently they noticed it's warm here, so they spend the winter. I am talking about the robin, which used to migrate in large numbers to

Southport and Brunswick, N.C. Now, with global warming, there are always some resident

throughout the year. We all know they enjoy worms, as well as bugs, fruits and berries. Their

cheerful caroling song is a familiar spring sound, territorial in nature. May is the most

wonderful migration month, because that's when the waves of warblers pass through. These

tiny jeweled dwellers of the upper tree stories display marvelous streaks, masks, caps, throat

patches, rump patches and necklaces of red, yellow, orange, blue, black and more. Like all insectivores, warblers have thin, needle-pointed bills, the better to snag their meals on the wing. Four warblers that I always see and hear in the West End are the yellow-rumped warbler, the redstart, the yellow warbler, and the blackpoll. Traveling in small groups, the

yellow-rumped warbler, DENDROICA CORONATA, is also affectionately called butter-butt,

for its bright yellow rump patch. It is crowned with gold, and has yellow beside the gray

wing. The white throat and breast are divided by a black band, and a black mask covers the

eyes. It is very mobile as it flutters amongst the leaves and sings its baby-like series of twitters and trills. If you keep a sharp eye and ear this May, I guarantee you will spot this warbler and the next in our area. SETOPHAGA RUTICILLA, the redstart, is a showy little

black bird with bright orange markings on the breast, wings and tail. Its butterfly-like habits of spreading its tail and drooping its wings flash its orange and black colors in a brilliant

display. The high sibilant (hissing-like), one or two-syllable songs really sound a lot like a chickadee. Strangely, the songs of these insect-eaters strongly resemble the buzzes and rattling trills of their prey. The yellow warbler DENDROICA PETECHIA nests here in gardens and by Peter's Creek. Its beautiful canary-yellow color makes it our only all-yellow bird. If you see a canary-yellow bird with chestnut belly streaks singing a cheerful, rapid

"weet weet tsee tsee" you have this warbler. The blackpoll warbler DENDROICA STRIATA

makes me a little sad. The last of the warbler migrators to arrive, its high metallic trill, like

the jingling of pocket change, signals the end of the spring warbler wave. Its gray and black

body, black cap and white cheeks, are the last of these brilliant little jewels of the spring, most of which nest either in our higher mountains, or further north and up into Canada. So we will

the goldfinches, towhee, and others, and has continued ever since.

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
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
