Thinking of an addition to your home?

Getting to home repair jobs you have put off until warmer (and/or dryer) weather?

Considering landscaping your yard? Taking down a tree?

Before you act, please call the Historic Resources Commission!

Any "Major Work" project, a project that changes the appearance of a building or a landscape in a substantial nature, requires a Certificate of Approval (COA) from the Historic Resources Commission (HRC).

Some activities will be considered "Minor Work" and may be approved by HRC staff; other more substantial jobs must go to the full Commission for a hearing.

No COA is required for "routine maintenance" when no change is made to the appearance of the structure or grounds. But when in doubt, give us a call and we can determine the level of review needed.

The West End Historic Overlay District boundaries were adopted in 1993, along with a set of Design Review Guidelines. The purpose of the Historic Overlay District is to protect the unique character of the neighborhood and its built environment and landscape features. These are the Guidelines that the HRC staff and Commission use when making their determinations. Copies are available through HRC staff.

The HRC meets once a month on the first Wednesday. Applications must be received 21 days before the hearing date. Staff can guide you regarding the information that must be submitted on the application.

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
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West End garden club beginning new season



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

Birds in the West End

Now we are at summer's end and the beginning of fall. Nesting is over, and the babies are out, grown and flying. The big migrations are just around the corner. Very soon the brilliant

little warblers will leave the northern forests and pass through on their way to warmer

plumages of these migrant warblers. Spotting them in the fall, it is hard to believe how

drastically each year. I would like to mention a special bird in our neighborhood. It is ubiquitous, yet almost invisible. The red-eyed vireo (vireo olivaceous) is distinguished from the five other vireos in our area by its red eyes. Don't worry; you are unlikely to spot this common bird, let alone its red eyes. As Peterson's Field Guide to the Eastern Birds says:

"The red iris is not obvious at any distance." But its song is very distinctive. Three or four

melodious chirrups then a deliberate pause; three more then a pause; three more and a pause,

and familiar summer song in the treetops. The red-eyed vireo itself is a smallish, dull olive bird with beige underparts. Should you follow its song and actually spot it way up in the trees



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
