Restoring Hanes Park

Voter approval of the city bond referendum in November 2014 provided a tremendous opportunity for our community to realize a long-standing dream.

One million dollars has been allocated for the restoration of Hanes Park.

The city is committed to hiring a project manager who is contacting stakeholders, including the West End Association, Friends of Hanes Park, the West Highlands Neighborhood Association, the WSFCS, and business owners near the park to identify and prioritize needs. West End Association President Mark Lively has been appointed to the citizen's bond committee tasked with overseeing bond expenditures.

The West End Association's efforts to restore Hanes Park to some of its former glory extend back to the 1970s. The Association has been an active advocate in support of appropriate preservation, management, and maintenance using a set of guiding principles that include preserving the historic character of the park and protecting open green spaces to allow flexible and shared use of the park by the entire Winston-Salem community. The WEA board has developed a strategic plan outlining recommendations that will be communicated to the project manager. (Visit www.historicwestend.org to view the plan.)

As the city's premier park, Hanes Park is a treasure that deserves preservation for future generations. A long list of maintenance and repair issues are outlined in the plan. These include recommendations on bridges, park entrances, paving, landscaping, and lighting. In addition, the WEA is recommending the relocation of the Daniel Boone Arrowhead Monument from its current inaccessible location to a place where it can be viewed and enjoyed.

In keeping with the effort to preserve green space, the WEA is opposed to the construction of new facilities and formalized paths and planters within the park and the continued expansion of school athletic facilities on park property. Any new purchases (replacement bridges, lighting, trash cans, benches, etc.) should reflect the historic nature of the park.

The impact of vehicle traffic is important for the safety of park patrons as well as those living in the surrounding neighborhoods. The WEA is encouraging the city to look at the issues of traffic patterns, parking, sidewalks, crosswalks, and traffic calming.

The bond funds bring not just the opportunity for repair and restoration of aging park facilities but also the responsibility to ensure that Hanes Park retains its historic character and continues to serve as a protected space for the entire city to enjoy.

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Hanes Park: A Vision for the Past and Future

In 1919, P.H. Hanes, the founder of Hanes Knitting Company, gave forty-seven acres to the city to mark the incorporation of Winston and Salem. His intent was for the space to be used exclusively for public purposes. The park that grew from his vision was part of a larger plan that included the construction of Wiley School and the gift by Katherine Reynolds of R.J Reynolds High School and Reynolds Auditorium to the city.

The park incorporated the design principles of Frederick Law Olmsted, the famous landscape architect who spear-headed the urban parks movement. Olmsted believed that the "design of a public space should take advantage of unique characteristics of the site, even its disadvantages," what he called "A Genius of Place." There should be a "Unified Composition" with "all elements of the landscape design subordinate to an overarching design purpose." The design should have an "Orchestration of Movement" to "subtly direct movement through the landscape...to avoid collision between different kinds of traffic" and an "Orchestration of Use" "ensuring the best possible site for each use and preventing competition between users." He believed landscape designs should be sustainable. That "plant materials should thrive, be noninvasive, and require little maintenance." Designs "should conserve the natural features of the site to the greatest extent possible and provide for the ecological health of the area." He advocated a "Comprehensive Approach" that sought "to have a healthful influence" beyond a park's boundaries and "acknowledge and take into consideration what surrounds it."

Olmsted's Design Principles continue to be as relevant today as they were a hundred years ago and can inform our vision for the future of Hanes Park.

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
