The 2018 tour will showcase eight historic homes constructed between 1874 and 1934. We are grateful for our generous homeowners who willingly share their beautiful homes during the holiday season. Forty years ago West End neighbors joined together to stage the first Holiday Homes Tour. It is a testament to the dedication and community spirit of the West End neighborhood that this tradition has continued without interruption since that time. # 2018 Holiday Homes on Tour

**124 West End Boulevard, The Poindexter Cottage, ca. 1874.** The Poindexter Cottage is the oldest West End Home on the 2018 tour. It is a one-story weatherboarded frame dwelling with a gable roof, a pair of interior chimneys, a front porch with chamfered posts and a plain balustrade, and a rear wing. To avoid demolition, the house was moved in 1978 from its original site at the SW corner of Spruce and Fifth Streets to its present location.

**633 North Spring Street, McGehee-Rierson House, ca. 1904.** The McGehee-Rierson House is a two-story frame, Queen Anne style house characterized primarily by its irregular configuration, multi-gabled roof (the main front gable clipped), and its bow fronted porch with turned posts and balustrade and fancy sawnwork brackets. The house was built at the NW corner of Spruce and Second Streets. This house was also threatened with demolition in 1978 when John P. Ozmun purchased it and moved it to the present site.

**701 Manly Street, Ray B. Diehl House, ca. 1926.** Prominently located on a hilltop with a double flight of granite front yard steps, the Diehl House is an excellent example of the influences of the Craftsman and Prairie styles on the domestic architecture of the 1920's. The two-story frame house has a low hip roof with widely overhanging enclosed eaves, groups of casement windows that increase the horizontal emphasis of the house, a broad Craftsman front door with casement windows for sidelights, and a granite front porch and front steps.

**633 Summit St., Dodson House, 1911.** The Dodson House was originally built by James & Lizzie Dodson. They commissioned architect J.S. Zimmerman to design the Colonial Revival residence for their family. The end result was a three-floor clapboard house with a wrap-around porch, Tuscan columns, and pediment entrance bay. It has recently been remodeled extensively by its new owners.

**608 West End Boulevard, Wall-Shoemaker House, ca. 1917.** This house is a handsome one-and-a-half-story bungalow with a pebbledash first story, a wood shingled

upper story, a steep gable roof with overhanging bracketed eaves, a front shed dormer, and grouped windows.

**800 West End Boulevard, Glenn-Angelo-Walker House, ca. 1915** - This exquisite home is typical of many houses throughout the West End built during the early 20th Century. It reflects a combination of Colonial Revival and Craftsman style influences. It features original craftsman style doors and windows throughout, and has a wrap-around porch with chamfered posts on paneled bases with simple brackets and a plain balustrade.

**817 West End Boulevard, Robert S. and Ida Miller Galloway House, ca. 1918.** Architect Willard C. Northrup designed this sophisticated Colonial Revival-style house for Smith-Phillips Lumber Company president Robert Scales Galloway and his wife, Ida Miller. Construction commenced in July of 1917 and finished in June 1918 at a cost of \$15,278.88. The stuccoed residence features a classical entrance surround framing a paneled door and leaded-glass transoms and fanlight.

**1040 West End Boulevard, Philip T. Hay House, 1934.** This large one-and-a-half-story bungalow is one of the most handsome in this section of the West End, largely because of its generous use of granite for the gable end chimney, the front porch plinths, the balustrade-foundation, and the dramatically curved front steps. Other features of the one-and-a-half-story weatherboarded house include a broad gable roof with overhanging braced eaves, fancy bungalow-style facade windows, and a projecting porch entrance bay.



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
